Hospital Quarterly: Performance of NSW public hospitals

April to June 2011

More than half a million patients attended public hospital emergency departments (EDs) during April to June 2011, 3% more than during the same quarter last year but only 2% more than two years ago at the start of the swine flu epidemic.

Compared with the same quarter last year, ambulance arrivals have increased by 4%, reflecting the general increase in ED attendances. Emergency admissions increased by 7,509 cases (+7%) since the same quarter last year and by 10,007 since two years ago (+9%).

The Bureau has not reported any ED performance measures in this report while it identifies new ways to report on patients' journeys through the ED.

Initial analysis by the Bureau suggests there may be differences across hospitals in the way ED information is recorded. These differences could make it difficult to compare hospitals.

As a result, the Bureau has made a decision not to report on ED performance in the September issue of *Hospital Quarterly*. We are conducting a more extensive analysis to understand these differences and improve the way we report performance information to support fairer hospital comparisons.

The Bureau expects to complete this analysis and revise how we report on ED performance in time for the December issue of our *Hospital Quarterly* report.

The next issue of *Hospital Quarterly* will include performance measures from April to June 2011 and July to September 2011 quarters to ensure the availability of time series information.

Emergency department journeys

When a person needs care in a public hospital emergency department (ED) they begin what is called a 'patient journey'. These journeys can involve many different pathways, but most follow a similar pattern, regardless of whether or not the patient arrives in an ambulance.

Upon arrival, patients are triaged (typically by a registered nurse) and allocated to one of five categories depending on how urgently they require care. Each triage category has a maximum recommended time in which the patient should wait to be seen by a healthcare professional and treatment should begin.

What happens next depends on the clinical needs of the patients but will often entail a more detailed assessment followed by treatment.

After treatment, they leave the ED or are admitted to hospital. **Figure 1** summarises patient journeys through NSW EDs during the April to June quarter.

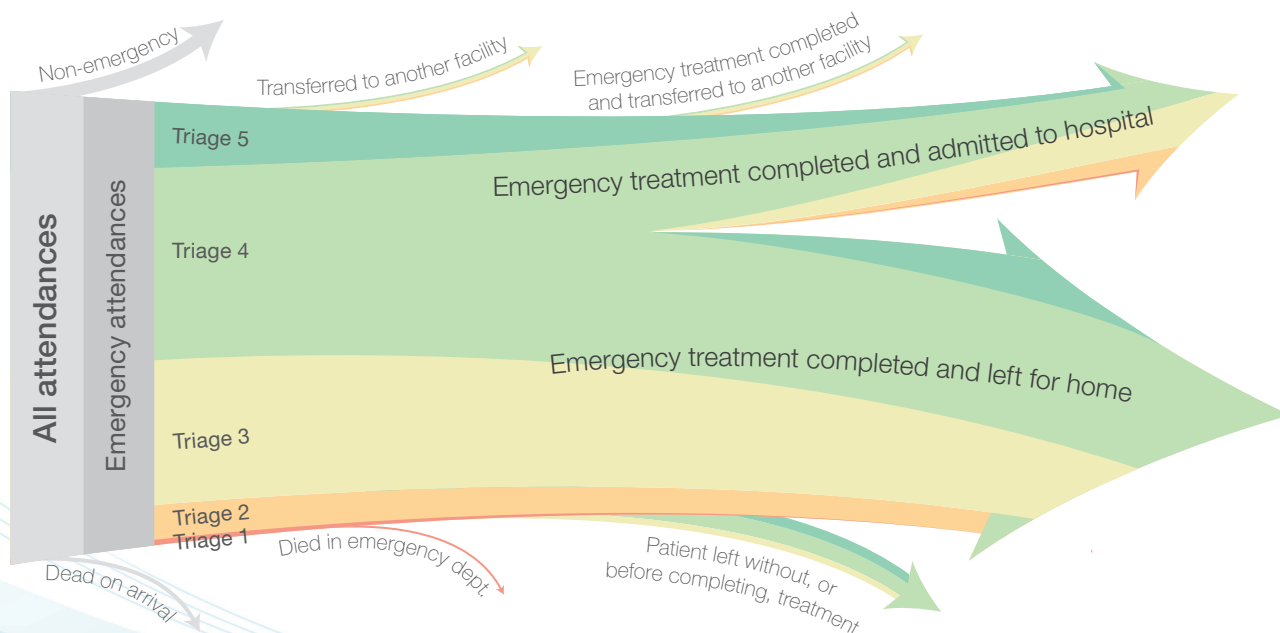
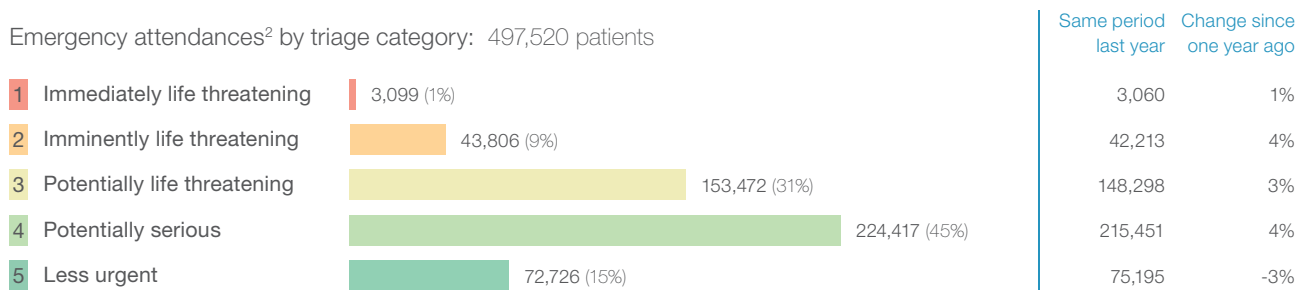


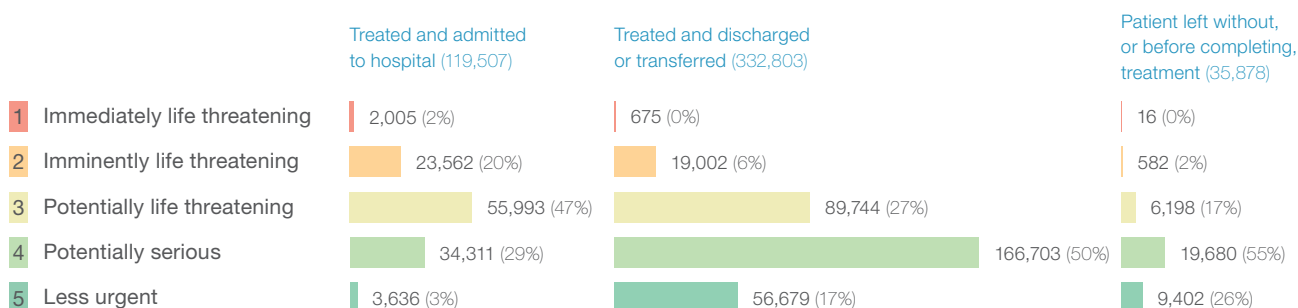
Figure 2: Attendances at NSW emergency departments, April to June 2011

There were more than half a million attendances at NSW public hospital EDs during the quarter (**Figure 2**). The majority of these were considered 'emergency attendances' and the remaining 15,072 patients arrived for planned or prearranged visits. Among this latter group, 1,707 were admitted to hospital via the ED.

A breakdown of emergency attendance figures shows that almost half of all emergency attendances (45%) were categorised as potentially serious (triage 4), 31% were categorised as potentially life threatening (triage 3), 15% were in the lowest urgency category (triage 5) and 9%

were imminently life threatening (triage 2). Immediately life threatening (triage 1), the most urgent category, represents less than 1% of all people triaged in emergency departments.

The three main ED patient journeys

Almost seven in 10 patients (67%) who were triaged during the quarter received treatment in the ED but were not subsequently admitted to that hospital. They were most likely to come from the potentially serious category (triage 4).

More than two in 10 (24%) were treated in ED and admitted to the same hospital, and were most likely to have a potentially life-threatening condition (triage 3). Less than one in 10 (7%) left the ED without, or before completing, treatment and these people were most likely to come from the least urgent categories (triage 4 and 5). Patients have a number of reasons for leaving before completing treatment, including being dissatisfied with the care they received or their reason for visiting resolved without treatment from staff.

Emergency attendances over time

Annually, ED attendance numbers are highest during October to December and lowest during April to June. In keeping with the usual seasonal pattern, ED attendances in the April to June 2011 quarter decreased from the level recorded for January to March 2011 (Figure 3), down by 13,629 to 512,592 visits (-3%).

Attendances for this quarter were 3% higher than the same quarter one year ago (496,182) but only 2% higher than the same period two years ago (501,932), the quarter immediately before the swine flu peak in July to September 2009.

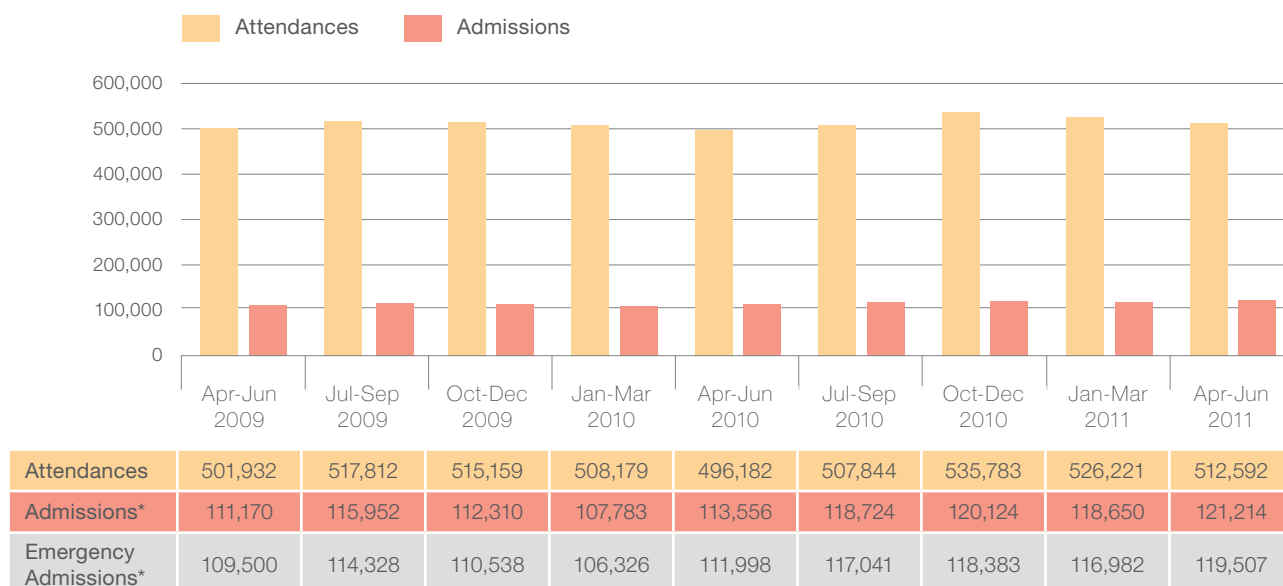
Arrivals by ambulance

A quarter (25%) of all people who attended NSW EDs during April to June 2011 were transported there by ambulance (Appendix 1), a total of 127,486 patients.

The overall number of patients delivered to emergency departments by ambulances has increased by 4% since the same quarter last year and by 5% since the same quarter two years ago.

In the April to June 2010 quarter, 25% of patients (122,200) arrived by ambulance and during the same period in 2009, 24% (121,372 patients) arrived this way.
